
LaRue Durrwachter to Sing With Glee Club



A graduate of Jersey Shore High School with the class of 1949. Durrwachter attended Lock Haven State College and Pennsylvania University. He spent two years in the Air Force where he co-founded the first Air Force skin diving team.

While with the Air Force in West Palm Beach, Fla., during 1955-56, he appeared in various shows, singing and acting under the name, Rudy Victor.

When Durrwachter was discharged from the Air Force he joined the J. Walter Thompson Advertising Agency, Chicago, as a trainee. After two months, he wrote live radio and TV copy for commercials and later became production director of Schlitz national sales convention which toured the United States.

THE ROAD TO LIFE



After leaving the entertainment world, Rudy pursued a job in the Marketing department at the Amway corporation in Grand Rapids Michigan. Eventually he became the senior art director with a full team of employees under him.

Being the people person Rudy was, he would get involved in discussions with his team on topics outside the normal scope of work. Apparently this one day he was talking to a co-worker about religion and death. Whatever the exact details of the conversation are unknown, but Rudy ended up making the comment; "What difference does it all make? We are all going to die and go to Hell anyways?"

Well this particular co-worker (Jerry Clements) happened to be a Jehovah Witness and replied back; "Not if you knew exactly what the bible says Hell is". It was then that he taught what the scriptures say about hell and death and placed the truth book with Rudy.

Rudy stayed up that entire night and read the book from cover to cover, verifying what it said against the scriptures in the bible. What he learned was the truth about the condition of the dead and the hope for a paradise on earth and a resurrection. Bursting with excitement he began studying the Bible with Jehovah's Witnesses. From that moment forward he didn't stop and never looked back, and pursued being a Jehovah Witness full time. Rudy made it a career and enjoyed teaching others about the truth and made himself willingly available to help further Kingdom interests here in Albuquerque NM.

'Godly Fear' district to conduct convention

The 1994 "Godly Fear" district convention of the Jehovah's Witnesses is being conducted through Sunday at the Amarillo Civic Center Cal Farley Coliseum.

All sessions of the convention which begin at 9:30 a.m. today and Sunday end at 5 p.m. today and 4:10 p.m. Sunday - are open to the public.

Highlights of the convention include a baptism service at 11:30 a.m. today and a Bible drama at 11:30 a.m. Sunday.

The public is invited to hear an address on "Why Fear the True God Now" by L. L. Durrwachter, program overseer, at 2:10 p.m. Sunday.



Linley Rockwell, who is serving as convention manager, state that the program will focus attention on the responsibilities of teen-agers as Christians.

"From past experience we have found that serious drama is an excellent means of getting a message across," Rockwell said, "Therefore the drama joins the discourse, the discussion and demonstration on our program of instruction."

He explained that local Witnesses have been rehearsing 3 and 4 times a week for the past 5 weeks to have the dramas ready for the Muskegon event.

"By the use of serious drama you can reach into the ancient past through God's Holy Word and bring to life before the eyes of delegates moving reenactment of laws and principles that are as forceful in this 20th century as they were when first recorded," Rockwell concluded.

C. B Blackburn of 206 Ken-O-Sha, S. E. has been directing rehearsals of the drama to be presented Sunday morning at 11. He reported that the drama participants will be authentically costumed to depict the styles of the 11th century before Christ.



The convention opens officially today (Thursday) at 2 PM with the address of welcome "The Good News Has Brought Us Together."

After Rudy was baptized as a Jehovah's Witness in 1958, he realized the most important work he could be doing now was that of preaching the good news of God's Kingdom. After a few years, he recognized that the organization of Jehovah's Witnesses was growing at a rapid pace and would need help in various areas of the United States. Thus, without hesitation he contacted the Branch Office in New York and asked where his family should help? They told him Albuquerque NM and the rest is history.

He quit his lucrative job with Amway in Michigan, sold his house and with the assistance of a brother in Albuquerque purchased a simple home via the phone (sight unseen). Once they arrived, he got to work and enjoyed many responsibilities in growing the kingdom activity here in ALBUQUERQUE NM. Over the years, Rudy enjoyed the privilege of being an Elder, Pioneer, Substitute Circuit Overseer, Assembly Overseer, City Overseer and Presiding overseer for Jehovah's Witnesses. He also had the privilege of teaching the Pioneer Service School, Elder School and gave featured public lectures at District Assemblies where there were 5,000 in attendance. He also enjoyed twice volunteering to work temporarily at Bethel headquarters. One of those visits included refinishing the chairs at the Stanley Theater.



One of the things he enjoyed the most was people. He enjoyed teaching others about Jehovah. He took to heart the scriptures and was known for being hospitable and assisting anyone he could no matter their age, status or circumstances. Never did he tire or complain of any spiritual responsibilities that were asked of him. He never said "*No*" to theocratic assignments, but was able to care for them without sacrificing the needs of his family.

He lived the truth, he never hesitated to speak about Jehovah and he took every opportunity that came along. Growing old was a curse for him, because he hated being slowed down in his service to Jehovah. He lived a life of self-sacrifice and it is evident by all the lives that he touched in one way or another.

His example will forever be cherished and imitated by his family and all those who knew him.

Rudy was one of the first to spearhead the work of preaching on the Reservations, particularly the Navajo and LaGuna. One experience he had was trading an Indian Chief the Live Forever book for a 6 pack of beer.

FISHERMAN & FISHER OF MEN

A COLLECTION OF HIS STORIES FROM "LORD OF THE RAINBOWS"

I told you so!

"There's a big trout in this hole!" "How d'ya figure?" Jim Phillips queried.

"We've been taking trout out of every nook an'cranny of this river until now. I caught a small one at the tail of this long hole and a couple oat the upper entry...but nothing in the hole itself. Been my experience that when that happens, a big trout occupies the hole and chases—or eats—every thing out!"

Jim Phillips and I had been having a ball catching stocker trout with salmon eggs all morning, in the San Juan River just north of Pagosa Springs (so much for being a fly-fishing purist). We found some easy-to-fish holes that were loaded for our two teenage nonangler daughters. We planned for them to have a ball making easy catches for an evening fish fry.

After supper, Jim and I decided to do some more fishing and headed for the river. Jim started just below the big hole (where I figured a lunker lingered) and I headed a 100 yards upstream to fish back toward him.

I caught a half a dozen foot long trout on the return leg and soon was facing Jim on the high bank side of the big hole, we're he was

intently floating salmon eggs through its deep flow.

slap scale". I stood, transfixed, at the air space just occupied by the magnificent rainbow.

Jim shouted, "That's the third time he jumped!"

"No Kiddin'....I told you there was a big trout in this hole!" Gosh I love when I'm right! which is about once out of a hundred times when it comes to outguessing my wife; three out of a dozen times with my kids; and, so far one out of one with Jim. **Probably** the fondest memories I have of fishing over the past 50 years were the episodes when we improvised to catch wily trout. One instance that comes to mind changed my way of fishing for a long time on a special river.



It started with my former son-in-law, Gary. He is a unique individual who is not content to copy the methods used by anglers fishing near him. Where I'll usually ask what's working today, Gary will remark, "I've got a yellow & black thing-a-ma-jig I wanta' try today," and proceeds to go against all prevailing angler wisdom... hauling in one big trout after another until I rapidly switch to his rig-a-jig to join in the action.

It was his desire to try something different that had us catching trout so fast and furious in New Mexico's famous San Juan River, we thought they would outlaw us. Or worse yet, some frustrated

angler would chase us off the water....due to our consistent success at catching fish after fish, cast after cast while standing right next to him.



The first time I fished about every other trout stream in New Mexico was a year later, when Jimmie Hartley (owner of Albuquerque's famous "Dog House" drive-in restaurant) offered me a deal I couldn't refuse.

If I'd teach him how to fly fish, we'd try a different river each week and he'd cover the meals and transportation. He had read every book on fly fishing, but in his own words, "was lacking the fishing exposure." One of the books he'd read was by my former Michigan dentist, Carl Richards, on nymph fishing. After I told him how I had weekended in Carl's cabin ---with shelves full of jars of nymphs (taken from the river flowing past his door), he couldn't wait to hit the streams a-runnin'. Every Wednesday, Jimmie would pick me up and we'd try another fishing spot. Every night he'd broil a sirloin over an oakwood campfire and we'd gobble the steak by hand... washing it down with a bottle of burgundy. During that summer I'd taught Jimmie how to cast a dry fly without hooking his-or-my ear; cast a country mile without snapping off the fly; chew on a fly to make it smaller; roll cast in tight quarters; recognize trout lairs in a stream; and set the hook without jerking the jaws off the trout. At season's end, Jimmie graduated with honors...catching a 17-inch brown in the Rio Chama without my help...except for the applause. PAGE 6

Needless to say, Jimmie and I became regular fishing buddies and have slapped many trout steam with our flies over the years.

I surprised Jimmie one fall on a salmon fishing trip to Michigan by stopping at my former dentist's office in Comstock Park. His eyes really bugged out when author Carl Richards, DDS, shook his hand and started relating how he and I nightfished for browns together, on the Rogue River.

Until then my first time fishing stories to Jimmie had just been onesided, but good ol' Carl now verified that the stories were actual.

Guess that proves it's not always true what they say about anglers: "The tail of the fish gets longer with

When he saw me, he yelled loudly over the water noise.

"Hey, you were right. There is a big -----," he was spreading his arms to demonstrate about a yard width and before he could say "trout in there," the water exploded in front of us.

The huge trout cleared 3 feet of water and floated an aerial layout that would make a spring board diver's heart stop. I swear he was trying for the lead in "A river runs through it." He just hung there, and hung there, and *hung there*... Defying gravity as only a monster rainbow can.

Then he crashed with a splash that hit "10" on the Beaver-tail-


